Our Children and COVID-19

In early March, COVID-19 was spreading around the world but no cases had yet been found in the countries where we serve. We felt very blessed and **asked our children to increase their prayers for their sponsors and all supporters of CARITAS.**

It was the most beautiful sight- all our children gathered in each location to pray for us. We were so moved and wanted everyone to know that a legion of Caritas-children were praying for all the members of our global family. 
By the middle of March, suddenly everything had turned upside down! The governments shut down schools in many countries and while some of our children were safely quarantined in Boarding School, others were **forced to go home even if they didn't have a home.** The toughest cases were in Haiti and Uganda, where our children have been obliged to remain "home" for 30 days. Then it was our turn to pray for them.

Unfortunately, this tight lockdown leaves the people on their own to fend for their needs until the curfews are lifted. We know that our indigenous ministry partners simply don't have the resources to share with those in need, at least not any wide-ranging kind of temporary support. **Therefore, we are trying our best to fill in for some feeding help.**

We quickly realized that our **top priorities were the homeless children and those whose families could not afford to feed them for the 30-day shutdown.** Since then, we have been in constant communication with our ministry supporters on the ground determining our next steps.

Overall, we are very blessed to be working with Catholic Religious brothers, sisters, and faithful lay people who all responded very quickly to the changes, were ready to help, and took on the extra workload whenever needed.

From our end, **we launched a temporary COVID-19 Feeding Initiative** (part of our Special Feeding Support) to meet this need. The funds raised **help children and even their family members who are in most need of food.** The beneficiaries include, but are not limited to, the children in our regular Sponsorship Programs. This program is a different way we can help our poor brothers and sisters, specifically with common food shortage issues, and also in emergency situations.

Throughout the weeks, we have received pictures of families living in huts, one room homes, or even just makeshift shelters; all smiling as they **received bags of food through our ministry.** Seeing these pictures brings us great joy, but also reminds us of how dire the need is: **for many of our children, this is a life or death situation.**

In Uganda, things became even more difficult as a nationwide travel ban was issued. This means that nobody is allowed to walk on the streets in groups larger than three people, driving a private car is completely prohibited, public transportation has stopped, and there are limits on who is allowed to ride around on boda bodas (motorcycles).

This next level of lockdown **made it illegal for our ministry team on the ground to drive** our Caritas vehicle to visit our families and bring them food. (con'd pg. 4)



Again, we are blessed to have great people on our team who came up with a clever solution. **Alon decided that he would become a registered boda boda taxi driver** so that he could still bring food to the poor children and families. Although it is much more dangerous, and more time consuming, it was the only way to move forward, and he was willing to do it. He also invited another teacher to get involved in the effort. **Let us pray for their safety during their ministry travels.**

In Haiti, Felix began by teaching our families how to be safe during the lockdown. We then were able to get resources in bulk and he **gave out masks and food to 30 families.** Violence has increased during the last few weeks in Haiti and we had to stop this way of support. **Felix will now be going directly to the families to keep our children and families safe from violence.**

Since we are all members of the Mystical Body of Christ, we know that your prayers are very effective. We ask you to **please pray for us, our ministry team, the children, and their families.**



The Nettesheim Family: Spreading Caritas One Child at a Time

It was around the year 2000 when Chris, our founder, approached Joel about putting his financial skills to work in the service of needy children. **Joel and Donna Nettesheim** have always been drawn toward causes that support child education, so getting on board with CARITAS for Children was an obvious choice.

Twenty years later, Joel and Donna are sponsoring the education of seven Ugandan children. Joel has now served as the board treasurer for two decades, and he and Donna both assist CARITAS with numerous accounting and financial services.

Two of their CARITAS-children are now attending university, while the others are in day and boarding school. **They've sponsored one of their university students since 2nd grade.** "It's very rewarding to watch her become an adult," says Donna, "become a person who will be able to make a difference in her society. It's like watching one of your own children grow up!"



For the Nettesheims, **supporting an educational ministry for children that also provides religious instruction and evangelization opportunities carries a lot of weight.** "It's a re-awakening of a spiritual commitment, especially to helping others. In the local church, this work is making people more aware of evangelization and God's work." Joel and Donna both view sponsorship as the **perfect chance to fulfill our Christian duty to help others in need, answering Jesus' call to "love one another" (Jn 13:34).**

"We're witnessing God's work actually happening, and what a lot of people don't know is what being involved with this does for themselves in addition to helping the children. **It's very rewarding!**" **They want others to understand that it may only be one child at a time, "but it really does help!"**

Sandra is a 17-year-old student from Nkokonjeru, Uganda.

Her father abandoned the family when Sandra was young, and her mother lacked the income to support her, leaving her in the care of a local Sister and educator.

In 2010, Sandra was sponsored through CARITAS, which allowed her to attend a local Catholic Boarding School.

Sandra has two years left of Secondary School (similar to American high school), but now needs a new sponsor to continue her education. She is a highly academic student with dreams of saving lives in her community. In Sandra's own words, "CARITAS has taught me to have zeal and love for education," and **her commitment shows in her class evaluations.**
